A Neighbourhood House is...

...A warm and friendly place where people of all ages, nationalities, orientations and abilities come together to attend, participate and belong, lead and learn about programs and services and to build their neighbourhoods.

Vancouver's first Neighbourhood House grew out of the Alexandra Orphanage, one of the province's first non-profit societies. In 1938, they closed the facility to re-open a couple of months later as the Alexandra Neighbourhood House. Incorporated in 1894, the Association of Neighbourhood Houses (ANH) was the 36th non-profit society in BC.

Since then, the 122 year old Association has grown into an organization of seven Neighbourhood Houses and one outdoor camp. At the forefront of community development and capacity building, the Association of Neighbourhood Houses of British Columbia (ANHBC) bridges community programs with individuals and families of all ages, abilities and nationalities, in more than 20 neighbourhoods across the Lower Mainland and BC. As a collective voice for inclusive communities, it sets standards for combined multi-service delivery, community engagement and the building of civil society. ANHBC is also undertaking the development of much needed affordable social housing in several communities.

ANHBC's Neighbourhood Houses and SOC serve more than 100,000 individual visits annually. Of those individuals, at least one third is children between the ages of two and eighteen. In one Neighbourhood House alone, over 400 families with children up to six years old are involved in family programs. ANHBC Houses serve many of the invisible poor including: new immigrant families living eight to one bedroom, underprivileged families unable to provide breakfast to their children, youth who lack leadership and are on the street and seniors living alone with no family ties. From seniors' lunches to daycare, cultural dinners to counselling support, over 50,000 hours of volunteer time are clocked across ANHBC, while a majority of the city's childcare services and adult support programs are provided by the Neighbourhood Houses. As one of the original Neighbourhood Houses in the International Movement of Neighbourhood Houses and Settlement Centres in Canada, BC now includes more than 20 Neighbourhood Houses with more than 100 NHs across Canada and over 10,000 around the world.

The ANHBC Mission... ANHBC plays a leadership role in building healthy and engaged neighbourhoods by connecting people and strengthening their capacity to create change.

1891 TO 1929

- 1891:** ~ Alexandra Women's and Children's Hospital officially opens at 1726 West 7th Avenue.
- 1894:** ~ The Alexandra Women's and Children's Hospital becomes incorporated as the Alexandra Non-Sectarian Orphanage and Children's Home.
- 1918:** ~ Seeing a need for children to have the opportunity to go outside the city for fresher air, the Alexandra Fresh Air Camp officially opens at Crescent Beach, Surrey.

1930 TO 1950

- 1930:** ~ Foster homes continue to replace orphanages and as such, the Alexandra Non-Sectarian Orphanage becomes a foster home.
- 1935:** ~ The foster home's name changes to The Alexandra Non-Sectarian Children's Home of Vancouver.
- 1938:** ~ The Alexandra Non-Sectarian Children's Home of Vancouver is closed and following the Neighbourhood Settlement House Movement led by Jane Adams and Queen Alexandra, the Alexandra Neighbourhood House officially opens at 1726 West 7th Avenue; becoming the first Neighbourhood House in Vancouver.
- 1942:** ~ Gordon Neighbourhood House officially opens at Nelson and Jervis, becoming the Association's second Neighbourhood House.
- 1943:** ~ Strathcona Day Care Centre, at 616 Cordova Street, opens for children of working mothers. This was a project of the Alexandra Neighbourhood House.
- 1944:** ~ The Association's name changes to Alexandra Community Activities.

1951 TO 1970

- 1955:** ~ Residents of the Cedar Cottage/Kensington area establish Cedar Cottage Neighbourhood

- 1962:** ~ A long-term lease for Camp Wallace is signed with the Province to operate a day camp for Neighbourhood House children. The camp is located within Belcarra Regional Park.
~ Gordon Neighbourhood House receives the City of Vancouver's first grant.
- 1963:** ~ Cedar Cottage Neighbourhood Services and Youth Centre becomes a Neighbourhood House at 4030 Welwyn Street.
~ The first Provincial daycare grant is received.
